Dear Secretary Mumin:

First and foremost, I want to thank you and the entire Commonwealth for all that you do for Temple University and our students and their families.

This will be the last time that I reach out to you as Temple University's president as I will be stepping down from this role at the end of this month, but I want you to know that it has been an honor to collaborate with both you and your predecessors. Put simply, Temple would not be able to thrive without the support of the Commonwealth, and you have been tremendous partners.

My departure as president comes at a time where I could not feel more confident about the direction of Temple University. On November 1, <u>John Fry will begin his tenure as Temple's 15th president</u>.

You are no doubt familiar with President-elect Fry due to his 14 years spent as president of Drexel University. He is a proven leader in higher education, and most importantly, he is the right leader for Temple University at this moment.

President-elect Fry is taking the reins here at Temple at the perfect time. The university presently has great momentum, and I am confident that he will build upon that in the future.

While I am stepping down as president, I will be continuing to serve Temple in the role of Chancellor, assisting President Fry in any way needed to ensure a smooth transition. I have always been this university's biggest fan, and that will no doubt continue as I move into this next stage of my career.

Appropriation, budget and finance

We are grateful for all that the Commonwealth does to help us support our students, especially the Commonwealth appropriation.

The appropriation is essential to helping to keep Temple's high-quality education accessible for Pennsylvania college students and their families. Each year, we use our own funds to almost double the state appropriation and thereby provide every in-state student with a tuition discount of at least \$15,000 relative to out-of-state rates.

The continued flat funding of the Commonwealth appropriation, however, creates considerable challenges. It has been six consecutive years that the appropriation has remained flat at \$158.2 million. Nearly 16 years ago, during 2008–2009, our state appropriation was \$175.5 million, and it has never approached that peak level since. According to the U.S. Bureau of Statistics, we would need to receive an additional \$67.1 million to keep pace with the 2009 appropriation.

Despite the challenges of flat funding, we remain diligent in our work to do all we can to address college affordability. Our mission is rooted in access and the notion that every bright young person should have the opportunity to pursue the high-quality education that is a hallmark of Temple University, and we will never deviate from that.

To that point, <u>our operating budget includes a \$35.5 million increase in financial aid</u>, and in total, we expect to disseminate nearly \$150 million of financial aid to students, in addition to financial aid support derived from our endowment or external funders. In total, the university's financial aid commitment represents approximately 26% of all undergraduate tuition we expect to receive.

As you know, I was recently appointed to the State Board of Higher Education. This new board is one of the first initiatives to come from Governor Josh Shapiro's <u>blueprint for higher education in Pennsylvania</u>, and we are grateful to the governor for putting forth a plan that is focused on both workforce development as well as college affordability.

One of the topics being discussed by this new board is a new performance-based funding model for Pennsylvania's state-related institutions, and Temple University has been an active participant in these discussions. Even prior to this board being formed, we have worked closely with members of the General Assembly and Governor Shapiro's administration for more than a year, discussing how this process has worked in other states and how it might be implemented here in Pennsylvania.

It is our hope that a performance-based funding model ultimately recognizes Temple's many strengths, such as the university's performance in outcome measures that include graduation rates, graduation rate performance and social mobility. Ideally, performance-based funding will also result in a much-needed increase in our state appropriation.

Enrollment

You have no doubt heard about some of the enrollment challenges facing colleges and universities across the country. In recent years, we have had our own challenges, too.

When my dear friend and colleague JoAnne Epps was named president in April 2023, she identified enrollment as one of her key priorities. Following her tragic passing in September 2023, I made the decision to carry on her work and continue the path she started for us.

Now, just over a year later, we are beginning to reap the benefits of our work. This fall, <u>we welcomed</u> more than 4,900 new first-year students, nearly 1,300 transfer students, and almost 2,200 new graduate and professional students to our domestic campuses. This equates to increases of 30% for first-year students, 29% for transfer students and 11% for graduate and professional students.

We are incredibly grateful for the work of our Division of Enrollment Management as well as faculty and staff across all the university's 17 schools and colleges and its many departments. From the very

beginning of this enrollment cycle, they have rolled up their sleeves and worked tirelessly to recruit this new group of Temple students.

The Class of 2028 is a remarkable group of young people. Once again, the class is richly diverse as it includes record percentages of students of color, Pell grant recipients and first-generation students. In total, 62.3% of the class identifies as a student of color. This year's new class of students are high performers in the classroom and have an average GPA of 3.42, up from 3.38 last year.

This class is indicative of how we are still proudly Philadelphia's public research university. Combining Philadelphia with the bordering Pennsylvania counties of Bucks, Chester, Delaware and Montgomery, 44% of the Class of 2028 hails from the greater Philadelphia region.

Our <u>innovative Temple Promise financial aid program, which we launched in February</u>, is just one of the ways that we eliminate barriers and keep a Temple education affordable for bright students who might not otherwise have the opportunity.

The new, last-dollar financial aid program has created a pathway for nearly 500 students from Philadelphia to attend this university. These students are part of the more than 1,100 new students from Philadelphia in the Class of 2028, which represents a dramatic increase over last year.

Included among Temple's new first-year and transfer students are more than 350 former and prospective University of the Arts (UArts) students. Since UArts suddenly announced its closure late last spring, Temple has worked diligently to support this community, and I am so thankful for the tireless efforts of all our faculty and staff members.

Public Safety

The other priority of former Temple President JoAnne Epps' that I have carried forward is public safety. It is imperative that all students, faculty, staff and neighbors feel safe to live, work and learn on our campus.

In the spring of 2023, we released the recommendations from the audit that was conducted by former commissioner of the Philadelphia Police Department Charles H. Ramsey and his firm, 21CP Solutions. We continue to make tremendous progress in this area as 85% of the recommendations from the audit have now been either completed, complete/ongoing or are in progress. All our progress is tracked through this <u>Safety Initiatives Dashboard</u>, which was launched one year ago.

As you may have also <u>read in The Philadelphia Inquirer</u>, several key crime statistics are down within the university's patrol zone.

We also continue to prioritize technology as part of our public safety efforts. Over the last year, we have installed or upgraded several hundred cameras. We also just recently became the first university in Pennsylvania to use Flock's license plate reading cameras, which are already paying dividends. The cameras recently helped recover the stolen vehicle of a Philadelphia community member.

With public safety, we also know the importance of playing the long game; the challenges facing large cities like Philadelphia are not something we are going to police ourselves out of.

To that point, this spring, we launched the Temple Community Gateway, a one-stop shop for connecting community members to resources or services available at Temple and its community and government partners. Its main areas of focus have been on assisting our North Philadelphia neighbors in the areas of entrepreneurship, job training and placement, and youth engagement.

Since its launch, we have made more than 200 connections with clients, and we have also identified more than 100 community partners who want to be part of the work we are doing at the Gateway.

iNest and small business incubator

As you know, Temple is an R1 university, meaning that we are among the few institutions nationally to earn the "very high research activity" designation. Our research enterprise continues to grow exponentially, and we now have a new facility to help support this remarkable growth.

This past spring, we launched the Innovation Nest, aptly nicknamed "iNest." This space is dedicated to incubating new innovations from Temple researchers and spurring our brilliant students to challenge themselves to create, invent and have a real impact on the world.

We also are in the process of looking for state support—potentially \$5 million in total—to launch a new small business incubator, which will nurture the growth and development of emerging startups and entrepreneurs.

When launched, we hope this incubator will provide aspiring businesses with mentorship, training, office space, networking opportunities, access to funding and additional resources.

We believe that these efforts can lead to significant benefits for Philadelphia and the Commonwealth, as our goal is to help spark the North Broad technology corridor. I know that this is an area that President-elect Fry is very excited to focus on when he arrives.

In closing, on behalf of Temple, I want to again thank you for your partnership throughout the years. The Department of Education does outstanding work, and I know you will enjoy working with my successor, President-elect Fry. I am eager to see how together, you will continue to uplift both the Commonwealth and Temple University.
