Temple University: Fiscal Year 2027 Budget Overview

Executive Summary

The Fiscal Year 2027 operating budget strategically addresses the evolving financial dynamics within higher education. Temple University is experiencing positive momentum, with projected growth in domestic and international enrollment alongside higher clinical revenues. However, Commonwealth support remains level, and the University faces rising costs in compensation, benefits, revenue sharing, and student financial aid.

To address financial pressures and manage a structural deficit, the administration implemented a \$60.0 million budget reduction. This action lessens the University’s reliance on reserves, reducing the draw needed to balance the budget to \$25.5 million. For actions impacting positions, the university prioritized the well-being of current employees to the maximum extent possible by first offering voluntary retirement, not filling positions following employee resignations, and eliminating vacant positions.

Fiscal Year 2027 is the third consecutive year the university has significantly increased its investment in undergraduate financial aid, a deliberate strategy to strengthen enrollment and improve retention. In Fiscal Year 2027, undergraduate financial aid is budgeted at \$196.2 million (compared to \$112.9 million in Fiscal Year 2024, an increase of \$83.3 million over the past three years).

Overall, the Fiscal 2027 budget is projected to increase by \$14.6 million, representing a 1.1% growth in total resources. This change is driven primarily by higher indirect cost recoveries from research activities and increased volume in patient care clinics, which are partially offset by a small decline in budgeted gross tuition revenue.

Revenue Framework

University operating revenue is categorized into two primary components:

- **Educational & General (E&G):** Supports the core academic mission, including instruction, academic support, student services, institutional support, facilities, and maintenance. E&G operations are primarily funded by tuition (78%), the Commonwealth appropriation (13%), and indirect cost recovery/other income (9%).
- **Auxiliary Enterprises:** Business operations that provide essential services to the campus community, including student housing, food services, bookstores, athletics, and parking.

Education and General Revenue Changes:

In Fiscal Year 2027, education and general revenues are projected to increase \$9.3 million or 0.8%.

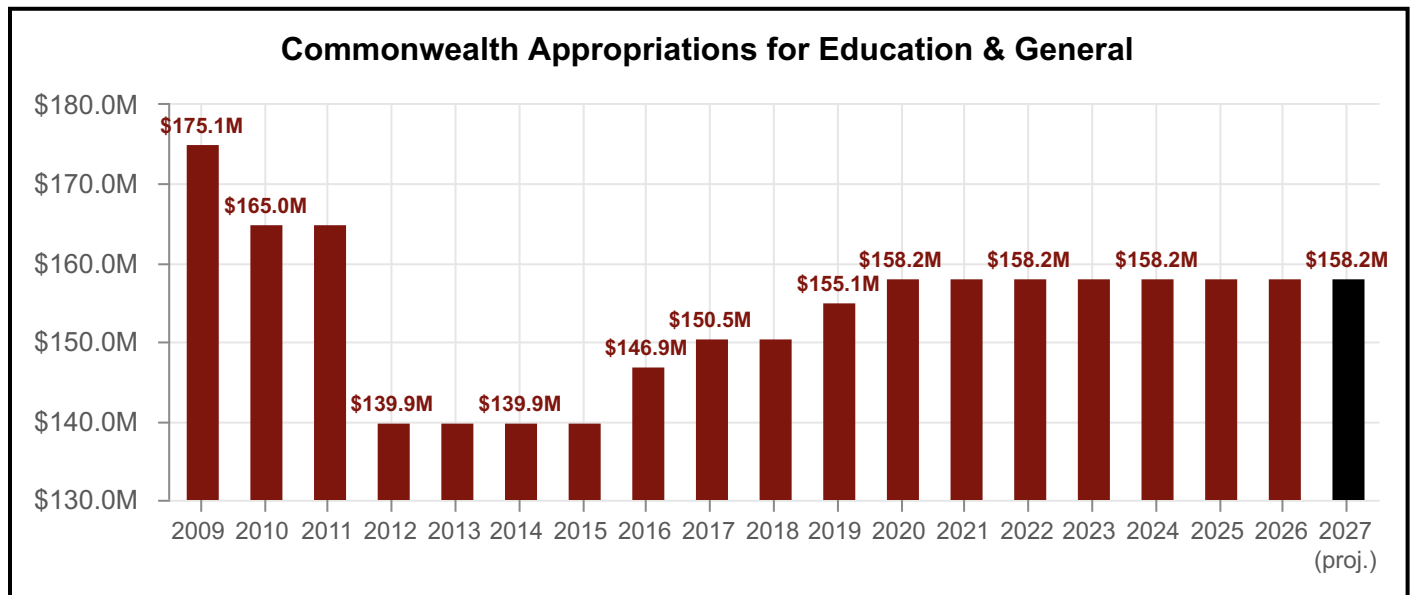
Tuition Rate Adjustments: Incorporates a blended undergraduate and graduate tuition rate increase of 3.4% for both resident and non-resident students. Professional school tuition rates are recommended by individual deans based on peer benchmarks, with increases ranging between 0% and 5%.

Enrollment Growth: Reflects a projected net increase of 112 students (80 undergraduate and 32 graduate/professional).

Mandatory Fees: The mandatory fee for full-time students will increase by \$21 per term (3.9%), bringing the total to \$549 per term. This revenue directly funds vital investments in student health, wellness, counseling, and critical support initiatives.

Gross Tuition Revenue Impact: Despite rate and enrollment increases, an enrollment shortfall from the Fiscal Year 2026 budget cycle has offset gains. Consequently, gross tuition and fee revenue (prior to financial aid) is expected to decrease slightly by \$(0.4) million, or (0.04)%. The proposed academic year 2026-2027 tuition and fee schedules are presented in Appendix B.

Commonwealth Appropriation: State funding for Fiscal 2027 remains level at \$158.2 million, unchanged since Fiscal Year 2020.



Grants, Contracts, & Other Sources: Revenues from indirect cost recovery on grants and contracts are projected to increase by \$5.7 million or 18.2%, as an anticipated reduction in the recovery rate did not

go into effect. Other income will increase by \$4.0 million or 6.8%, driven by increased clinical revenues from the Kornberg School of Dentistry and higher rental income.

Auxiliary Revenue Changes:

Auxiliary enterprise revenue is projected to increase by \$5.3 million or 4.3%, primarily driven by adjustments to room and board rates in residence halls.

Expense Framework & Adjustments:

The Fiscal Year 2027 budget reflects a disciplined approach to expenditure management, prioritizing core operations, contractual labor commitments, and strategic student financial aid.

Key Expense Changes:

- **Compensation & Benefits (+\$34.0 million total):**
 - **Compensation (+\$25.7 million):** Reflects a blended 3.0% increase to fulfill collectively bargained labor contracts and merit pools for non-represented employees.
 - **Benefits (+\$8.3 million):** Reflects a blended 8.9% increase driven by rising medical costs, prescription plans, and post-retirement expenses, partially offset by benefit recoveries.
- **Financial Aid (+\$12.3 million):** Represents a crucial investment to enroll the incoming class and retain continuing students. This includes \$22.3 million allocated for new students, offset by a (\$10.0 million) adjustment due to the prior year's enrollment shortfall (which resulted in less aid awarded than originally budgeted).
- **University Investments (+\$11.1 million):** Funds increases in strategic investments in technology infrastructure, public safety, institutional advancement, and a strategic allocation fund.
- **General Expenditures (+\$10.6 million):** Driven by student fees, graduate tuition remission, clinical operations, study abroad programs, and research incentive adjustments.
- **Auxiliary Enterprises (+\$5.3 million):** Expenses are projected to increase in direct correlation with auxiliary revenue growth.
- **Strategic Budget Reductions (-\$60.0 million):** To mitigate the deficit, expenditures were reduced by \$60.0 million across individual schools, colleges, and support units.

Use of Reserves

In Fiscal Year 2026, the University balanced its budget by utilizing \$26.8 million from reserves. In Fiscal Year 2027, the University's reliance on reserves to balance the budget will drop slightly to \$25.5 million.
